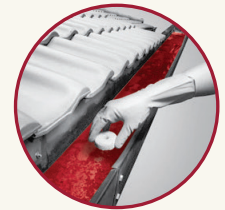

Prevention of breeding around your house is the key measure!

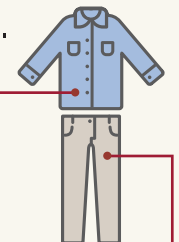
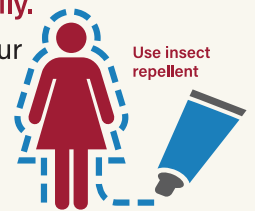
Everyone can take action! Take out 10 minutes every Sunday, to look for any water stagnation in and around your house!

- Check your flowerpots, the rear of your refrigerator, any coconut shells or pots in the garden, the plants in your common areas, check if your water tanks have lids on.
- Drain out any water.
- Ensure regular garbage clearance from around your society/colony.



Safeguard yourself and your family.

- Remind your neighbours and your society, to check for mosquito breeding every week!
- Use mosquito repellent cream liberally when going outdoors.
- Prefer to wear full-sleeved clothing.
- Do not self-medicate for any fever, other than taking paracetamol and lots of oral fluids.



Every Sunday, get on a Search and Destroy Mission against the Aedes mosquito!
